NRJ is an international, interdisciplinary forum devoted to the study of natural and environmental resources. NRJ's contributors come from various disciplines, represent many countries, and provide many approaches to the complex issues raised by the need to balance resource development and environmental concerns.

New Mexico Law Review

NMLR is New Mexico's signature legal journal, with a focus on articles of interest to practitioners in the state and throughout the Southwest. Contributing authors from across the country include law professors, attorneys, judges, and NMLR staff members, whose work is regularly selected for publication following the fall of 2L year.

Tribal Law Journal

TLJ is the premier Indigenous law journal in the United States and is one of the few international legal journals dedicated to Indigenous and tribal law. Contributions include tribal court case comments, reflections on tribal systems, the development of tribal law, the value of tribal law, interviews, and teachings. The TLJ updates and makes available the Tribal Court Handbook annually.

Application Process: Write-on assignment typically administered through Twen the week following spring semester final exams. The assignment includes a writing and citation portion. You may apply to NRJ and NMLR simultaneously.
