MINUTES



4. Examination schedule was distributed for comments and suggestions.

6. Inasmuch as the proposal adopted at the meeting of September 24, 1973, was declared unfeasible by University Administration, the amended Proposal by Special Committee on Grading was adopted by the faculty (see attached).

PROPOSAL BY SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON GRADING

(1) A law student may elect one course, which is not a course required for graduation, on a credit/no-credit basis. First-year students may take an elective course, with the exception of Role of the Lawyer in Society, on a credit/no-credit basis.

A student may elect a course on a credit/no-credit basis even though he or she is taking one or more courses in which the entire class is graded on a pass/fail, credit/D/fail or similar basis.

(2) The credit/no-credit election, which is irrevocable, shall be made within the first two weeks of the semester.

(3) A professor is to grade all examination books on an A/B/C/D/F basis (except those books which are late and which the professor must grade on a credit/D/F basis). The secretary of the law school will then report a "credit" for each book with an "A/B/C" grade and a "no credit" for each book with a "D" or "F" grade.

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
