FACULTY MEETING MINUTES Tuesday, September 28, 2004

- I. The meeting was called to order at 3:05 pm.
- II. Approval of Minutes
 - A. Minutes from Aug. 31, 2004 meeting approved.
- III. Report from Dean and Associate Deans
 - A. Dean Scarnecchia:
 - 1. Dean will be going to Washington D.C. beginning 9/29 for a meeting with Sen. Domenici. They will be discussing how UNMSOL can better serve NM.
 - 2. Update on US-Mexico Law Institute
 - a. UNMSOL is separating from the Institute after having an affiliation for many years. Support has included:
 - 1. providing administrative support for conferences.
 - 2. publishing the journal.
 - b. An examination of the relationship indicated that it is no longer mutually beneficial.
 - c. Negotiations that took place in an attempt to avoid separation were not fruitful. The decision to separate was difficult, but the separation was amicable. The groundwork was laid to keep a working relationship.
 - d. The Institute will likely go to the University of Florida.
 - e. Discussion:
 - 1. Margaret Montoya: Discussions of the future of the US-Mexico Journal should involve SHRI (Southwest Hispanic Research Institute).
 - 2. Leo Romero: This move has needed to happen for some time.
 - 3. Memorial services at UNMSOL for Lee Teitelbaum proposed. Scheduling/planning will take place among interested faculty members.
 - B. Kip Bobroff report:
 - 1. Next Thursday from 10:00 am -2:30 pm: Tribal Leaders Summit scheduled. All are invited and encouraged to attend, including a brainstorming session in the afternoon. Talk to Bobroff to participation.

- 2. Next Thursday at 4:00 p.m.: Indian Law convocation honoring Toby Grossman. Sam Deloria will give the keynote address. RSVP to Mitzi Vigil (Indian Law Program coordinator).
- C. Rob. Schwartz report upcoming events:
 - 1. Wed., 9/28, at noon: Faculty lunch Prof Hart will give a presentation on grading.
 - 2. Fri., 10/8, at noon: Faculty lunch Zillman on military law.
 - 3. Tues., 11/9, from noon to 3 p.m.: Law and Medicine Day 2nd-year students released for activities.
 - 4. Last week in February: "Law School Sampler" Looking for faculty members to give 1-1½ hour presentations for the school and the community at large.
- D. Antoinette Sedillo-Lopez report:
 - 1. Report on Access to Justice Panel.
 - a. Goal: to expand legal services to low-income people.
 - b. AJP averaging over 100 referrals per month.
 - c. AJP developing courses for lawyers who participate. Sedillo-Lopez seeking input on developing such courses.
 - d. Antoinette is also seeking suggestions for names of attorneys who would be appropriate to take on as part of the referral network.
- E. Jenny Moore report:
 - 1. Curriculum Committee has begun putting together the curriculum for the next academic year, with a good amount of feedback from faculty.
 - 2. Feedback on a prior faculty discussion about proposed changes to the student writing requirement has been very good. A draft of the new proposal is tentatively scheduled for consideration next spring.
- F. Carol Parker report:
 - 1. Two new library departments are being created:
 - a. Faculty and Public Services headed by Ron Wheeler
 - b. Technical Services headed by Michelle Rigual
 - 2. Other physical changes:
 - a. New front gate
 - b. New paint
 - c. New artwork (on semipermanent loan) to be displayed, hopefully beginning this fall.
- G. Peter Winograd report:
 - 1. Chairing the Government Relations Committee of the ABA's Section of Legal Education & Admissions to the Bar.
 - 2. Major project for the coming year is to increase the annual caps on federal loans for graduate/professional students and to modify the Income Contingent Repayment (ICR) Option.

- 3. ICR proposal would reduce the repayment period to 15 years from 25 for graduates who spend 8-10 of those years in low-income public service employment. In such cases, any remaining balance would be forgiven after 15 years.
- 4. Several meetings were held during this summer with legislators and their staffs; they will continue over the coming months, along with development of a national grassroots network of law student volunteers prepared to lobby when needed.

 - 3. Associate deans are looking at what sort of need UNMSOL will have for visiting professors for next year.
